



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
#### Change in Regional Spending and Pupil Count: SY 2004-05 to 2014-15

Total spending rose 35.6 percent in current dollars and 11.7 percent when adjusted for inflation.

The region lost students at a faster rate than the State as a whole, with a 10.6 percent drop in students, compared to a 7.6 percent drop statewide.


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#### Limited English Proficiency Rate: Region vs. State
